

At the beginning of the ~~film~~ visual text, Will ~~so~~ compares himself to an island. "Every man is an island" by this, he refers to the idea that ~~extremely~~ ~~man~~ he thinks he is able to stand alone and doesn't need to rely on others. Will burys himself in possessions such as flash tv's, the latest stereo, and home espresso makers. He doesn't think that people can make him happy.

In contrast to Will, Marcus is a very quiet boy that relies on his relationship with his mother to be happy. This all changes when his mother overdoses and tries killing herself. Marcus realises that you need more than two people to be happy. Because when there is only two, as soon as one of them is gone you're alone. This is the turning point where Marcus wants to become good friends with Will.

When Marcus makes his way to Will's apartment for the first time, the director uses special effects.

to emphasise the uncertainty Marcus has. The shot of Marcus walking up to Will's door becomes blurry and fuzzy. This shows the audience that Marcus isn't sure about what he is going to get when he opens the door.

Marcus and Will become good friends as they end up spending a lot of time together as Marcus began turning up to Will's apartment every day after school. Marcus taught Will that to be happy, we don't need loads of flashy items all we need is some company and friends.

However, since the incident where Marcus' mum attempted killing herself, Marcus wanted to make her happy. Marcus and his mum sang the song "Killing me softly" together and Marcus' mum told Marcus that his singing brightened up her life. At school Marcus had the chance to sign up for a talent show which is what he did. His goal was to sing sing the song 'killing me softly' to his mum in front of ^{Anselma} to make her happy. When Marcus was signing up for the talent show, the director rotated the camera ~~so~~ which ~~begin~~ began upside down and rotated till it was the right way up. This showed the audience that Marcus was 'turning his life around'. However, Will knew how the school would react to his performance and make fun of ~~him~~ so Will

~~at~~ the start of the film we see a pair of hands lighting two candles. This scene is in colour. The priest sings a song then exits the scene. As he leaves the scene the candle's blow out into a wisp of smoke. This is a strong symbol of the destruction and the hardships that the Jews are about to face. //

Further on in the film the audience views the ~~big~~ liquidation of the Krakow Ghetto. It is a very violent ~~setor~~

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part of the movie. The audience views a woman tap on a piano key. We then see the awaiting Nazis spring into action. Spielberg cleverly uses light to suggest to us what happens. Instead of actually watching the woman get murdered we see the flashes of light from the gun on the walls. This reveals to us of the murder however we do not actually see it. This specific technique is used again when the man who is under the bed is murdered. We ~~don't~~ do not actually see the movies however we see the flashes of light on the wall. Lighting showed me the true hardships ~~of~~ that the Jews faced during this difficult time. //

What people say is often a clear indicator of their nature. The Dialogue in Schindler's List is no exception. Dialogue helped me understand ~~but~~ the idea of one man changing the world by changing himself. Oskar Schindler did change the world. ~~Sten~~ At the film's beginning Oskar

He is only out to make ~~money~~ money. He ~~sees~~ sees the Jewish situation as an opportunity for profit. "The Jewish worker gets nothing. Poles you pay wages. The Jewish workers salary gets paid directly to the SS. The worker gets nothing." Schindler replies, "Poles are more expensive, why should I hire Poles?" This helped me to understand how heartless he is at the start of the film //
